Manhattan will be highlighted along with the remarkable interconnections between the many cultures that worked and lived in **Dutch Manhattan**.

The New Amsterdam Trail offers a city walk –guided by an audio tour - through Dutch Manhattan. A 2nd citywalk takes visitors along places in 'old' Amsterdam with New York history. Narrator of the audio tour is Russell Shorto, author of the bestselling novel *The Island at the Center of the World*. While listening to Shorto, the tourist walks the New Amsterdam trail through downtown Manhattan. The former location of the Stadhuys (City Hall); The Heere Gracht or Gentlemen's canal, nowadays known as Canal Street; The walls of the eastern shore line; Fort Amsterdam; The Singel (The North wall of Dutch Manhattan) and Wall Street; The bowery (or farm) of Peter Stuyvesant. The trail through 'old' Amsterdam visits 'Schreierstoren', Oost-Indisch Huis (where Hudson signed his contract), West-Indisch Huis and John Adams House. The tour can be printed, downloaded (I Pod) and can be explored on line.




EXHIBITION: 'NEW AMSTERDAM. THE ISLAND AT THE CENTER OF THE WORLD'

Introduction

As Russell Shorto's book describes the history of Dutch Manhattan in the 17th century, this exhibition takes its visitors a step back into that history. We will see rare maps, plans and views, letters and documents, all of them manuscripts.

Visitors will see the island of Manhattan as it was in the early years after Henry Hudson's third voyage in 1609. The first pioneers will share their impressive stories. Their arrivals, their struggles and successes will come to life. The foundation of the city in 1625 will be relived and rare documents relating to this unique moment in American history will be on display: New York's very first maps, and other rare and important maps and views of Manhattan and surrounding areas.





But before encountering this part of the exhibition, you will see 'The World', a large section of 30 wonderful watercolors drawn by Johannes Vingboons, a Dutch cartographer. His views and plans depict places all over the world as it was seen at the times New York was founded till approximately 1670. They provide us an unique impression of the 17th century European world of trade as to understand the second section, the 'Island at the Center of the World' much better.




An audio tour with lively fragments of Russell Shorto's bestseller "The Island at the Center of the World" adds to the experience.

'THE WORLD'

The first New Yorkers from abroad, from where exactly did they come? Angola, Senegal, Brazil, Ireland? Before entering the Manhattan section of the exhibition, visitors will stroll along 'The World', presented by 30 colorful watercolors drawn by Johannes Vingboons.

You'll see the routes of the New Yorkers: cities, regions and countries from all over the world from where the first inhabitants of New York left for their new homeland: Jewish refugees from Recife (Brazil), freed slaves from African coasts, the first settlers from Puerto Rico, Santa Domingo, Havana.

Vingboons' watercolors depict places all over the world as they were in 1600-1665, pro-



viding a unique impression of the 17th century European world of trade. We will encounter many other places like Osaka (Japan), Mexico City as well as islands in the Caribbean. These maps and views show the settlements of Spanish, Portuguese and Dutch trading companies, from Japan to Nova Scotia, bays on foreign oastlines and trading cities like Malacca and Cape Town.

The maps reveal the history of early Dutch trading, of newly made discoveries by



sailors, of warfare at sea between competing European nations, and the existence of hundreds of small and large overseas settlements controlled by the Dutch, Portuguese and English.

Through Vingboons' work, we can picture what sailors saw from their ships 400 years ago. Vingboons' art opens up the world of the 17th century.




'THE ISLAND'

'The Island at the Center of the World' will be the main theme of this exhibition. After understanding the worldwide trading network of the European companies, visitors will understand how and why New Amsterdam took shape and become the uncrowned capital of the world.

From all over the world people traveled to Dutch Manhattan ('New Amsterdam') to work, live and to raise the next generation. Maps, views, plans and documents give us information about the traders, freed slaves, citizens and craftsmen of that period, who came to the newborn town to live and work. They arrived in hope to experience freedom of religion, to earn a living or for other reasons.

By showing the earliest and most extraordinary maps of 17th century New York, the island will be experienced just after it was 'discovered' by Henry Hudson, until around 1670.

Vingboons maps, views and plans of New Amsterdam and New Netherland

Cartographer Johannes Vingboons drew the world, as we see it in the first part of the exhibition. One of his most splendid maps is the view of Manhattan, as seen above.

In 1664 he drew this view of Nieuw Amsterdam after a sketch made 15 years earlier by Augustinis Heerman. Augustinis made the preceding sketch for the government in the Netherlands. He depicted Manhattan in its true condition: houses with collapsed roofs, a mill with only two vanes and a damaged fortress wall. By showing the poor situation of the buildings to the board of directors, he hoped to make them understand that the new settlement needed funds to improve. In a way his request was fulfilled: our draftsman Vingboons gave the houses shiny red roofs and strong walls. Even the mill got its missing vanes back.

Besides this map, there is another important map by Vingboons: a plan of Nieuw Amsterdam from the De Medici Library in Florence (see p. 1 of this document). The map shows the Fort, the Brede Wegh (Broad Way), de Wal (Wall Street) and Paerle straat (Pearl street). These two maps are the oldest depicting this small town Nieuw Amsterdam.

THE MASTER-PIECE

'The purchase of New York for 60 guilders'

In 1625 the Dutch West India Company gave orders for the construction of fort Amsterdam near the mouth of the Hudson River. The acting director choose the island Manhattan as the best available site for the settlers which had been sent by the WIC to 'Nieuw Nederland'.

The Dutch wanted to protect the land of New Amsterdam and the surrounding farms. The New Netherland administration and the Native Americans signed a contract effecting the legal disposition of Manhattan to the Dutch.

The National Archives in The Hague keep the letter by Pieter Schagen of November 5th 1626, in which this purchase of Manhattan is described. He mentions the purchase of the island of Manhattan from the Indians for goods worth sixty Dutch guilders. The concept of such a transaction (meaning permanent possession of the land) was foreign to them.

This document will be one of the masterpieces of the exhibition. The letter was written to the Dutch Government by administrator Pieter Schagen, who also described the situation in New Amsterdam based on the latest information.



New York City's maritime past comes alive at South Street Seaport Museum. Along the bumpy cobblestone streets towards Pier 17 you'll find the South Street Seaport. Located down Fulton Street, this maritime museum reflects New York City's past glory as a port town. The museum is located in a complex of restored 19th century buildings located on the waterfront of the East River, in the hart of down town New York, just near Wall Street.

The museum sits in a 12 square-block historic district that is the site of the original port of New York City. The Museum is comprised of over 30,000 square feet (2,800 m²) of exhibition space and educational facilities. It houses exhibition galleries, a working 19th-century print shop, an archeology museum, a maritime library, a craft center, a marine life conservation lab, and ... the largest privately owned fleet of historic ships in the country.
